

The Impact of Pupil Premium Grant on the Attainment of Children entitled to the grant 2017-2018

The percentage of children eligible for free school meals in 2017/2018 was 11% (23), which is below the national average (15.2%-23.9%)

At Ashton St Peter's Church of England Primary, there are a very small number of children (between 1 and 6) entitled to Pupil Premium in each year group. Therefore, comparing the pupil data of the children entitled to Pupil Premium and those who are not is a challenge as one Pupil Premium child can represent such a large percentage; the data can therefore be easily distorted, particularly where there are individual children with individual needs e.g. special educational needs. Whilst the attainment data for each individual child (and cohorts of children in each year group) is explored in depth by school leaders, when comparing to the rest of the school the progress data is used.

The information below compares our Pupil Premium children – 2017/2018 (and Ever-6) to the non-disadvantaged children nationally 2016/2017
